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

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Money for nothing?



Wine: To diversity!

"So many wines, so little time," said Fred Tasker in *The Miami Herald*. Whenever I think about the 1,021 wine grape varieties that are available in the U.S., I can't help wanting to seek out something new. Should you feel the same, here are three bottles to prime your taste for adventure.

2012 J. McClelland Charbono (\$35). Charbono, a grape from France, thrives in California. This big, tannic Napa wine tastes of blueberries, black plums, and Asian spices.

2011 Pombal do Vésuvio (\$24). This hearty Portuguese wine features two sturdy grapes—typically used in port—crushed by barefoot workers. It offers floral aromas plus more spice and black plum.

2013 Tascante 'Buonora' Carricante (\$20). Carricante grapes grow on the volcanic slopes of Sicily's Mount Etna, and yield smoky, fruity, minerally whites like this one.
